

SUCCESSES

Designed a ELL Rapid Reclassification Program

- > 22% reclassification rate outpacing CA!
- ➤ Won CSBA Golden Bell Award 2024
- RFEPs outpacing English only students academically

Created Nationally Recognized Sci/Phy Program

- ➤ Won national Project Lead the Way Award
- Recognized by Classrooms of the Future

Increased Attendance & Reduced Chronic Absenteeism

➤ 6/7 schools reduced chronic absenteeism by 22% - 53%

Homeless Liaison

- Established ecosystem of support with over 40 community partners for students & families
- Secured Promise Neighborhoods federal grant & California Community Schools Grant

NEEDS

- Fund Education in Top 10 States
 - > Top 10 States: \$18,000 \$24,000
- Additional Homeless/Foster Youth Funding
 - McKinney Vento federal funds only provide approx \$80/student
- Increased Special Education Funding
 - > Total cost of Special Education Program = \$13 M
 - ➤ Current general fund contribution = \$8.7M (67%)
- Increased Base Grant Funding
 - > TK-3rd: \$11,000 w/ GSA
 - > 4th-8th: \$10,177 \$10,478
 - > 9th-12th: \$12,460 w/ GSA
 - Supplemental: Approx \$2,200
 - > Concentration: High of \$3,000 @ 100% UPC
- Utilize Alternative Methods of Calculating Poverty Rate for CNS & UPC than F/R Meal Application
